Governing structures, safety roles and responsibilities for the WA Speedway Industry



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The Western Australian State government through the Department of Sport and Recreation supports the WA Speedway Commission and implementation of the Speedway Safety Governance Framework.

Who we are

The WA Speedway Commission is a non-profit sporting association appointed as the governing body for speedway in Western Australia. The Commission is a democratically formed body, made up of a Board, Advisory Committees and office administration support.

- The Commission is directly answerable to the WA State Government through the Department of Sport and Recreation
- The Commission is responsible for delivering safety oversight and training processes for the sport of Speedway in WA
- The Commission provides services to a broad range of speedway stakeholders, including:
 - Clubs/ promoters
 - Associations and racing divisions
 - Local government and/ or land owners
 - Government insurers (local and state level)
 - Industry insurers

What we do

The role of the WA Speedway Commission is to:

- Promote and assist in delivery of safe speedway across WA
- Provide independent and impartial advice, and work with speedways to continually improve safety
- Provide advice and information to Clubs and Associations, but also to local government land owners and other stakeholders about risk and possible areas of liability
- Develop and promote systems, specifications and guidelines for consistency in speedway safety procedures across WA
- Deliver speedway training and accreditation programs across WA for stewards, officials and scrutineers.

Our business is to implement the Four Pillars of Safety developed in the Speedway Safety Governance Framework, 2010 (see diagrams below).

The four pillars of safety

Oversight system – The Safety Governance Framework


In 2010, a group of speedway stakeholders assisted RiskCover, the WA government insurer, to produce the *Safety Governance Framework*. Updated in 2013, the Framework guides *self-regulation* of speedway for the benefit of all stakeholders.

The Safety Governance Framework is the government accepted regulatory process for speedway in WA. It coordinates safety activities between all stakeholders and the application of existing legislation, regulations and approvals. The Safety Governance Framework:


- Is relevant for every speedway venue in WA
- Provides a systematic process of safety checks and balances to give confidence and consistency.

The majority of tracks across the state successfully use the Framework, contributing to:

- A stronger more coordinated speedway community
- Development of best practice safety for the sport.



How we work with Stakeholders



Shared Responsibilities

All stakeholders have responsibilities to support the delivery of safe speedway as part of their duty of care.

Stakeholder	Responsibilities
Clubs/ Promoters	 Obtain government approvals and adhere to conditions Develop and maintain the speedway venue to minimum standards set for WA in the WA Speedway Commission Racetrack Safety Guidelines Obtain annual WA Speedway Commission Track Licence and Event Permits adhere to the conditions of licence and permits Ensure use of only appropriately accredited officials, stewards and scrutineers at events Ensure the Chief/Club Steward provides a post-event report Maintain suitable public liability insurance that covers speedway racing activities Coordinate and deliver safe events, adhering to rules and specifications
Associations/ Racing Divisions	 Contribute to development of national racing division Specifications and Rules Ensure vehicle logbooks are issued and maintained Ensure vehicle scrutineering is conducted in accordance with Specifications and Rules
Stewards	 Complete a post event Stewards Report for every event and return it to the WA Speedway Commission Liaise with 1st Aid and Emergency personnel and other officials to deliver safe events Maintain accreditation through WA Speedway Commission training and seek opportunities to improve/ refresh skills Maintain logbook of officiating duties
Scrutineers	 Maintain accreditation through WA Speedway Commission training and seek opportunities to improve/ refresh skills Maintain logbook of officiating duties Undertake duties and work with other officials to deliver safe events
Drivers	 Obtain personal accident insurance Adhere to rules of racing, codes of conduct, and instructions of accredited officials, stewards and scrutineers
Local government/ Land Owners	 Approve venues for speedway use, issue leases where required and ensure compliance with conditions Ensure compliance with legislation and regulations, such as Public Buildings, Health, Environmental Protection Act on safety and risk information provided by WA Speedway Commission, including enforcing safety requirements Support WA Speedway Commission in assisting clubs to achieve good practice in safe operations, and maintenance of minimum standards
WA Speedway Commission	 Administer the Safety Governance Framework on behalf of the WA Government Conduct biennial Safety Assessments at all WA speedways in accordance with standard safety criteria Issue a Track Safety Assessment report and Track Grade to the Club/Promoter and the Local Government Authority, identifying required improvements and recommendations for risk management Issue WA Speedway Commission Track Licenses and Event Permits to Clubs/Promoters Communicate the status of track licensing and permitting to Local Governments and Department of Health for issuing Health Certificates Provide independent and impartial advice and information to stakeholders about safety, risks and possible areas of liability Develop and promote systems, specifications and guidelines for consistency in speedway safety procedures across WA Deliver Training and Accreditation programs across WA
WA Government	 Supports speedway safety through funding and program initiatives with WA Speedway Commission

Shared Benefits

The Safety Governance Framework provides a number of benefits for speedway clubs, promoters, associations, government and their stakeholders. Some of the benefits include:

- Provides a systematic process of safety checks and balances
- Provides confidence that safety measures are in place
- · Provides for a consistent and coordinated state-wide system
- Safety is assessed by people with specialist speedway knowledge
- Independent of any insurer or insurance product
- Provides an avenue for sharing the latest safety information and useful tips
- Specialist training is delivered in regional centres
- Assistance for clubs/ promoters with risk management systems and information to meet Duty of Care obligations
- A body of knowledge is collected that can be used to identify trends and emerging issues in the sport
- Provides a back-up to a club's record keeping on events (e.g. if a claim was brought and an incident on a certain night needed verifying)
- Information about venue safety advised to land owners by people who understand speedway
- Source of independent information for local government and their insurers to understand their assets and assess risks and liabilities
- Single source of information about the sport for state government (e.g. health department reporting, a consideration as part of Department of Sport and Recreation grant assessments)
- Confidence that speedway as an industry is self-regulating and self-managing.
